A few weeks ago in New York, a major operation was launched by the FBI against la Cosa Nostra. After hearing in the 1980s and 1990s about the mafia suffering critical blows at the hands of law enforcement – and after a decade of US attention focused on al Qaeda and preventing terrorist attacks – the arrests come as something of a shock. Has the mafia regenerated? Will these arrests now make a decisive difference? And in an era where transatlantic relations are seen as passé, is the U.S.-European partnership that led to these arrests proof that Europe still matters?
